- e) To provide for the continued professional development of our staff and volunteers.
- f) To foster a greater awareness in society of the dynamics and impact of sexual violence and crime.
- g) To recruit, develop and retain a highly experienced, quality staff.

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ABOUT US


Established in 1992 Kerry Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre (KRSAC) is a unique support, advocacy and information service for all female and male survivors, and young people aged 14 and over who have experienced sexual violence, including rape, sexual assault and childhood sexual abuse.

Our main objectives are to **reduce the distress and suffering of people affected by sexual violence** through the provision of support and information, and to **increase awareness of sexual violence and its impacts** within the wider community.

To deliver these objectives, we provide a range of trauma-informed support services for survivors of sexual violence, including short-term and longer-term support, advocacy, outreach, group support and awareness programmes.

The Centre employs dedicated counsellors who are trained to the highest standard and accredited with the Irish Association of Counselling and Psychotherapy.

The Centre is governed by a Board of Directors. The Board comprises of directors with legal, finance, counselling, education, communications, policing and project management experience.



The structure adapted by the Company is democratic and non-hierarchical. The role and views of the staff and volunteers are crucial to the delivery of the strategic plan and therefore have a direct role in decision making structures.

The Strategy outlines the work of the organisation over the next five years.



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The plan outlines a set of three strategic themes and aims agreed by consensus and geared at achieving the long-term vision for the development of the Company.

An implementation plan has been agreed for the effective implementation of the strategic plan.

In the compilation of the plan the consultant met with staff, volunteers, Manager and Board of Directors of the Company during a series of focus groups one-to-one interviews, and a series of review and planning meetings.

SERVICES

COUNSELLING

The Centre has a team of highly qualified and accredited counsellors providing a free one to one counselling service to survivors of sexual violence. Group counselling is also provided for survivors. Outreach counselling is also available in Killarney. This service is available by appointment only.

SUPPORT SERVICES

Accompaniment to Courts

Court accompaniment is available to all victims of sexual violence engaging with the judicial process, from the initial complaint to and including the trial process. This service is also available to parents and families of children who report sexual abuse. The service provided includes:

- Explaining the court process and visiting courtrooms
- Providing emotional support during the trial
- Clarifying legal terminology
- Helping victims come to terms with the outcome of the case
- Informing victims of any follow up proceedings
- Providing post trial support

Helpline Support

A free phone help line is provided for people looking for advice or information. The support can be focused on providing information and guidance or providing counselling. This service is available from Monday to Friday- 9am to 5pm.

Supports to families and friends of survivors of sexual violence

The Centre also provides supports to families and friends of survivors.



EDUCATION & AWARENESS

Safety Awareness Youth Information Training (SAY IT) Programme for secondary schools. Topics covered include:

- Sexual violence and its effects on victims, family and friends
- Myths and attitudes around sexual violence
- Bullying and sexual harassment
- What you can do and where you can get help

Counsellors are also often requested to give talks and workshops to various organisations and groups on a range of related issues.
